Dear Friends:



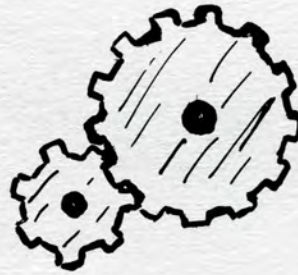
ELSIE LEITCH

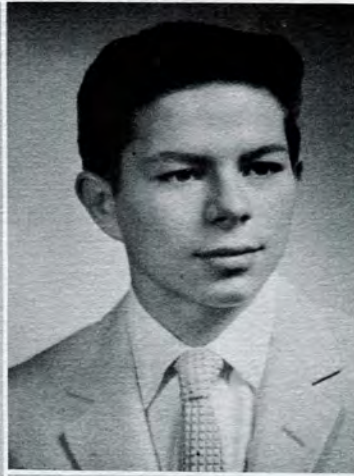


RONALD BINIENDA

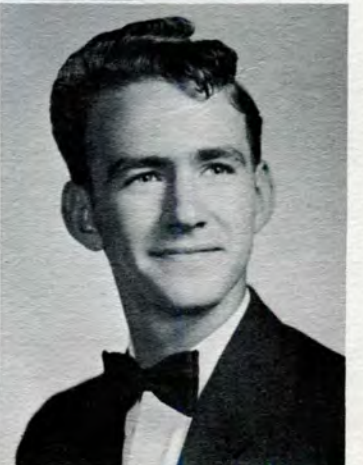
JOE FORNARESIO

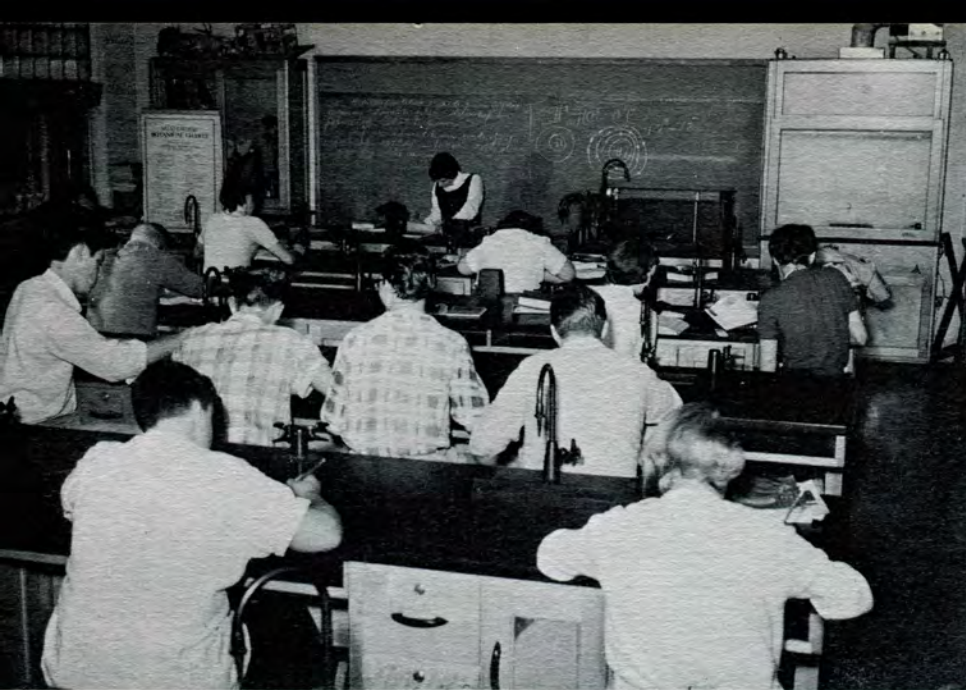
Rehearsals for the senior play, "The Imaginary Invalid" started the middle of March with production on April 11 and 12.
